FROM YOUR DISTRICT COUNCILLORS FOR BISHOP'S ITCHINGTON, FENNY COMPTON AND NAPTON WARD

PLANNING

Since the elections in May, the new administration has been looking at various aspects of this important activity at the District Council. We have asked for an over-arching review of planning, which has just started. This will be supported by external funding, which the Council has obtained. Stratford District receives a relatively high number of planning applications and work is also continuing on the planning policy framework, which governs how planning decisions are taken.

At a recent training event, it was said that, up and down the country, many people complain about planning decisions being illogical (other words are sometimes used!) The important message to get across is that it is policy 'rules' that decide things, although that can be a matter of difficult judgement sometimes.

Work is continuing jointly with Warwick District on a new main policy document – the local plan – due to come into full force late 2026, but we are in the hands of central government, whether that will stand or be interfered with in some way.

The Council is working through the delayed recommendations of the working group from 2022 and is implementing measures to improve the management of 'custom and self-build' planning applications. Some of these schemes have proved to be contentious with a few larger sites coming forward claiming exemptions to policies that would have prevented 'normal' housing developments.

A 'Statement of Community Involvement' is a current consultation and your views are important to the new administration. Some elements of how the council receives planning feedback are out of date, mainly as practice was amended to suit the pandemic period, but you may wish to comment on any other aspect of how communities can input to the planning process, both policy and applications: The closing date is Friday 3 November.

COMMUNITY SAFETY

Police Constable Donna Parry of Southam Safer Neighbourhood Team has returned to work full time and continues to work with her team based at Southam Police Station.

Nigel met on site with the Police this month and discussed the potential for improving speeding problems in Napton - Poplar Road and the main A425. The Police also attended Priors Marston Parish Council for a discussion with residents on speeding. These are difficult problems, with no easy solution, either for the County Council or Police, as in reality it is a small portion of offenders that cause significant issues.

Natalie attended the Warwickshire Police and Crime Panel meeting on 21 September, as the representative for Stratford District Council. During the meeting, the Commissioner emphasised the importance of residents reporting crime to 101 as it assists the Police in directing their resources.

ROAD CLOSURES & ROAD WORKS

It is hardly news that road closures continue, but the last month has seen quite concentrated activity, especially going east towards Rugby and Northamptonshire with closures on both sides of the county boundary and on the Dunchurch road. These have been due to HS2, Severn Trent, Highways, and Fibre Broadband works. I have just had notice of more Severn Trent Works in Napton. HS2 closures between Boddington and Wormleighton will be with us for a long while.

FROM THE CHURCH OF ST MARY THE VIRGIN

The Interregnum

Sadly, I have no news of progress to report. We shall be advertising for two House for Duty Priests, but the large number of documents we've had to supply to the diocese are still being examined by various officers.

However, the <u>Very Good News</u> is that, as I write, our new visiting priest will be with us this coming Sunday (15th October) and then each month on the 3rd Sunday of the month for as long as we need him. He's called Rev David Herbert and he's already been much appreciated by the congregation at Lower Shuckburgh.

It's interesting to note that, because Churches in the C of E all have the privilege of choosing the particular hymn book they prefer (and there are a great many!), it's up to the churches themselves to choose the hymns for each service. We usually like the hymns to reflect the message of the sermon, based a passage from the Bible (and most churches follow the prescribed advice on this), but even so, this can be a difficult choice. The main thing is of course to choose what the congregation know and can sing!

Harvest Festival

There were certainly hymns we know and can sing at the Harvest Festival service on 8th October! Over 50 people, including nine children, attended a service full of variety and interest. In all, over twenty people took part. One message received the following day included the following comments:

"Just wonderful to see the community, and indeed the farming community, come together. The harvest festival is important on so many levels, religious, social and community. Bringing the community together is a wonderful thing."

So, huge thanks to all whose help enabled us to achieve such an enjoyable and rewarding evening, from the basic organisers, those who provided the wonderful floral arrangements, all those who took part in the service in a number of different ways, those who prepared and served the refreshments and those who took home the washing up!!! And of course, our 'resident' group of Handbell Ringers.

The collection amounted to almost £200 and when the total has been finalised, one half of this will be sent to the Royal Agricultural Benevolent Institution.

The 'dry' food from the service will, by the time you read this, all have been taken to the Food Bank. We've learnt that it is best, at this time of year, to take the food in small quantities as we are not the only church having Harvest Festival AND taking the food to the Food Bank! On 9th October, so much food was received that storage space had to be temporarily 'borrowed' from elsewhere!

Remembrance Sunday - 12th November

We shall gather at the War Memorial at 9.00am for the traditional service in which we remember the Fallen from our village in both World Wars. We shall lay our wreath and observe a two minutes' silence during the service. We invite all residents of the village to join us. Refreshments will be served after the service and we shall continue the theme at 5.00pm at Evensong.

Poppies will be available in the church on Sunday 5th November and a collection will be made round the village from 23rd October.

The Radbourne Reburials

As you may know, during excavations for the new railway line, HS2 contractors discovered a medieval settlement in the Radbourne area including a church and graveyard. They managed to avoid disturbing the remains of the church itself and many of the graves, but a total of 25 could not be avoided. These have all been exhumed and will be undergoing scientific tests for up to 5 years; but the question of where they should be reburied marks us out as the nearest and most relevant church. Thus, two adjacent plots are being reserved immediately adjacent to the north wall of the Chancel, and a wedge-shaped plaque with appropriate wording will be placed with them. This application has been complicated and lengthy, involving the diocese and ourselves as well as HS2, who will be paying the cost.

So don't expect any movement for a long time yet, but many thanks to Christopher who has master-minded this matter with immense patience and perseverance!

This year some of the most recent gifts found their way into church as part of a window decoration - on their way to the Food Bank!! So an even bigger 'Thank you' to the donors who continue to support us so generously, and provide another witness to the (all-year-round) community character of our Harvest Festival celebration!!

<u>The flow of used stamps</u> in the past month was more like a waterfall!!! Just a few to start with and then a large envelope full! All are of course very welcome. It's always a pleasure to collect them and therapy to trim and sort them!

And Finally ... A huge "Thank you" to Gill our new Chair of the village, and Jane who organised the food and the many others who applied for and secured the grant and contributed in so many ways to make our Village Fish & Chips Evening such a resounding success. With the weather so favourable, the enjoyment lasted well after the daylight!!

GARDEN JOTTINGS FROM BRIDGE NURSERY

Your local Hardy Plant Specialists

Some of you will be thinking this is the time of year for slowing down and maybe 'putting the garden to bed'. I'm asked about when I will be closed and the answer is unhelpfully vague. If, and it is a big if, the weather is not too cold or wet, then I will be carrying on gardening and producing plants ready for the new year. It has been almost impossible to keep up with the growth of plants and weeds, so now is a good time to catch up. So if I'm at work at the weekends, I may as well have the gate open, you can always phone to check first.

I've already started to dig over a patch of the garden, removing couch grass and other weeds, removing the old rather scruffy plants then adding compost and re-planting with Geranium Anne Thomas. There are other jobs too, such as mulching the borders, mowing up leaves and adding to the compost bins and splitting and dividing some of the larger clumps of perennials. It's likely that the pruning saw, loppers and secateurs will get used a lot because many of the shrubs have been neglected recently.

If you haven't already done it, you will need to protect any slightly tender plants such as shrubby salvias before the frosts start, remember last winter, when we all lost loads of different things? Anything growing in pots might need some hessian or horticultural fleece wrapped round them to protect the roots. Hopefully it won't be so bad this time.

WEATHER JOTTINGS SEPTEMBER 2023

Total rainfall for September 2023 was 64mm, well above the average for September this century, which is 54mm. In 2000, September brought 122mm of rain and in 2005 we had 105mm, but since then, the wettest September was 2019 with 91mm and the driest 2014 with 11mm. Of the other months, about half of the Septembers yielded less than 50mm.


The first eleven days of the month were dry. Following the cool trend at the end of August, the first two days of the month were 15°C and 18°C respectively. Then it warmed up and summer returned, the temperature rising gradually to 32°C on Wednesday 6th, but then dropping off again to 24°C on Monday 11th.

Tuesday 12th was dull all day, with rain on and off amounting to 11mm in all, and only 18°C. Wednesday 13th was better at 20°C and then followed four mostly fine days, which all followed the same pattern – bright sunny start until late morning, then cloud cover for most of the afternoon, followed by a sunny evening. I think that has something to do with moisture and the change in temperature!

For the rest of the month, the temperatures were mostly below 20°C, with rain falling on 6 of them. During the night of Monday 18th, there was a good thunder storm between 2.00and 3.00am, which produced 11mm. The wettest day of the month was Wednesday 20th, when it rained all day and the temperature remained at 16°C. Other significant rainfall came on Tuesday 26th with 9mm.

By the end of the month, most of the leaves had fallen from the Plane trees near the bus shelter – and there were conkers falling from the Horse Chestnut trees just along the road!
