

The New Council Plan

The New Council Plan was approved at Full Council on 11 December 2023. Our aims and areas of focus will be as follows:

- Residents and Communities
- Health and Wellbeing
- Climate Change
- Housing
- Delivery of Service
- Local Economy

Budget

The administration is in the process of setting a budget for the year 2024/5 and we are pleased to announce that no cuts to services are anticipated. Central government advises local authorities of their settlement figures on an annual basis (rather than three or five years) which makes long-term planning difficult. The final figure from central government was reported to SDC on 22 December. Due to these tight timescales, Cabinet has been working on the budget for some months prior to the central government figures being announced. The preliminary figures were finalised following the Christmas break. By the time of printing, the budget will already be out for public consultation and we welcome your comments.

Cost of Living Support

We should like to remind residents that there is wide-ranging help and support available from the District Council if they are worried about the cost of living, which affects health and wellbeing. The support is not solely limited to financial help and residents may be signposted to many different resources. Fire and Rescue

Warwickshire Fire and Rescue Service are consulting on a proposed change to its service and are inviting comments from residents. A link to the consultation is here:

HS2

The cancellation of the northern part of the route has all sorts of implications, but mostly emphasises what a waste the whole project represents, as some of us predicted. The Transport Select Committee has heard that the cost of Phase 1 of HS2, linking London and Birmingham, is now likely to be as high as £66.6bn. The Government's decision to scrap the northern leg of HS2, would also mean that fewer seats will be available on trains to Manchester compared with current services, as trains will have to be shorter, while HS2 trains will also have to slow down on conventional tracks as they cannot tilt on bends, increasing journey times. Here in north Warwickshire, the effects on land take arrangements for connecting spur lines trains has not yet been worked out.

Community Safety

There have been reports of people purporting to sell household items in a number of villages prior to Christmas. We are also aware that a number of properties were broken into over the 2 and 3 January and other break-ins were reported in Southam. All matters have been reported to the Police. We appreciate that this is very upsetting for residents and we attach advice from Southam SNT if you have an unexpected caller.

We wish all residents a happy and healthy 2024.

Southam SNT tips if someone unexpected knocks on your door

- Lock your back door before answering the front door
- Never agree to have work done by somebody who knocks on your door
- Use a spy hole, chain or window to have a look at the caller before answering the door and keep the chain on. If you do not recognise the caller speak through the closed and locked door
- Always ask for proof of identity. Take it from the person (through the letterbox) and read it carefully before deciding what to do
- Never use a 'phone number provided by the caller as it could be a false number to an accomplice
- Avoid going outside so they can show you what needs doing as they will probably have an accomplice who will enter the house while you are distracted and steal from you
- Never pay for work before it is completed. Always agree a final price in writing and get an invoice and a receipt as proof of payment
- Do not accept any offer to drive you to the bank to withdraw money or give them your bank details
- Tell them you are not interested and ask them to leave. If they refuse call the police and dial 999 if you feel at risk or are being threatened or pressured
- Never give bank details to a caller, even those claiming to be from charities. Police will have a list of charitable organisations visiting your area which can be checked by calling 101. We recommend that you contact the charity directly if you wish to make a regular donation through your bank or building society
- If you have any doubt, keep them out and remember that you do not have to open the door. Report any suspicious activity to the police on 101 or 999.

FROM THE CHURCH OF ST MARY THE VIRGIN

Our Services

We have an A2 laminated, full-colour map of Israel in the time of Jesus and have had it suspended from the pulpit throughout Advent and until Epiphany, so we could trace the journeys undertaken by the Holy Family.

CHRISTMAS SERVICES

<u>Sunday 3rd December</u> – the first Sunday in Advent at our 9.00am service for families, we remembered Mary & Joseph setting out from Nazareth for the journey to Bethlehem. We used Bob Hartman's poems and the congregation joined in the refrains – as well as 3 hymns. We also had a pony with her rider, thinking of Mary! About 30 attended. <u>Tuesday 19th December</u> – was our torchlight carol singing at the Lychgate, accompanied by organ music from the Hymnal. Our group of handbell ringers opened the proceedings and played again later. There was mulled wine to end with. Again, about 30 present – but not all the same people as came to the Family service!

<u>Christmas Eve, 24th December</u>, our annual, traditional Carol Service at 6.00pm gets bigger every year! The Handbell ringers introduced the service with three carols, and then the readings and congregational carols proceeded uninterrupted until the talk and final prayers. This time, 157 people were present including 20 children. The singing was amazing!!! The collection amounted to about £500, which we are donating to the British Red Cross appeal for Israel and occupied Palestinian territory.

<u>7th Jan- Epiphany 9.00am</u>: An all-age service, to which we welcomed three Kings in costume, bearing the traditional gifts and a Queen on another pony, who brought a gown for the baby! We studied, on a much wider map, the route the Three Kings probably took to get to Bethlehem – about 600 miles. Then we looked at where Mary, Joseph and Jesus went after the kings had left – down to Egypt to avoid Herod who was out to kill the baby Jesus. Our final activity was the Chocolate Nativity – a whole string of surprises for those present, to represent all the surprises at the first Christmas. Once more about 30 present.

So that was our 'suite' of Christmas services. There were some of the younger people who attended all four!! It was noticed!!!!

<u>Our services for February</u> will be back to our normal routine! (Sigh of relief!) The Christmas 'season' will end at Candlemas – Friday 2nd February, so the liturgical hangings will change to green. But only for a couple of weeks. Easter is early this year – Sunday 31st March, leaving only two Sundays before Ash Wednesday, 14th February, which begins the 40 days of Lent during which the frontals will be purple.

The Church Building

The new area at the back of the church is now cleared and we were able to use it for the Carol Service. There is still some plastering to be completed, which is due at the end of January. Very many thanks to all who contributed to this amazing transformation!

The heater on the back wall has been repaired, so this should be quite a cosy area in the near future.

The faulty joints in the guttering have now been repaired as well!

<u>The Churchyard</u>- We have now made arrangements for a new green shed to be placed near the bins under the Yew tree. A stone flag base will be provided. The shed will be used mainly to store the mower.

The Christmas 'season' will end at Candlemas – Friday 2nd February. This is the time when all Christmas wreaths etc should be removed from the churchyard, please!

Our next PCC meeting will have taken place on Monday 22nd January, so more news on that later!!

Donations of food have been most generous and also of toiletries. These are very gratefully received at the food bank as they make a lovely surprise for the recipients. So if by any chance you enjoy a hotel stay but don't use the little packages, please give a thought to the Food Bank!!

NATURE NOTES ON A SUNNY DAY . . .

... having had a run of terribly warm, wet and windy weather - including rain which once again flooded the lowest room in the house - we are at last experiencing some cold, sunny weather which is much more 'normal' for the early weeks of the year. I recently invested in a small wildlife camera in order to check whether 'our' hedgehog had hibernated yet, or was still up and about and eating the food we were providing - and 'yes' it was still visiting, but so were the neighbours' cats, which was annoying. Other wildlife which is currently confused is the report of a female Blackbird already sitting on her first clutch of eggs, and Red Admiral and Brimstone butterflies on the wing!!

Once again, I am reminding everyone that the annual RSPB Big Garden Birdwatch takes place on the last weekend of January $-26^{th} - 28^{th}$. All the details can be found here:

FLOWERS FOR FEBRUARY

Most of us will be looking forward to the spring - we've had enough of the winter wet and cold, so anything which will make us feel cheerful will be welcome. Snowdrops, hellebores and early daffodils will be most commonly seen. Primroses and violets look wonderful grown together and multiply easily. Slightly more unusual are some of the winter flowering shrubs. Viburnum botnantense 'Dawn', V. tinus and Lonicera fragrantissima are all likely to flower right through the winter. Hazel catkins are developing at this time of year and look good in a vase with daffodils. To see a much wider range, take yourself to any of the botanic gardens where there will be an abundance of winter colour.

Now is a good time to buy seed potatoes and onion sets., Sow sweet peas and broad beans in cell trays and put out of reach of hungry mice., Towards the end of the month, you can start to cut down any ornamental grasses and other herbaceous plants... and prune dogwoods by removing two thirds of all stems to the ground.

WEATHER JOTTINGS DECEMBER 2023

December 2023 had the rather unusual characteristic of beginning rather cold and then becoming very gradually warmer as it progressed. There were frosts on the first two mornings, with daytime temperatures which only rose a couple of degrees above freezing all day! By the second weekend of the month, the maximum daytime temperature had risen to 9°C and after another two weeks it had risen to 13°C. (There was, however, a frost on Wednesday 6th). By the end of the month, the temperature had fallen back to 10°C and 2024 began even a bit cooler!

December 2023 will go down in history mainly for its exceptionally high temperatures, the highest of which here was Sunday 24th with 13°C. However, according to the MET Office, the record for December in England is 17.7°C in Chivenor, Devon on 21st December 1985 and in Penkridge, Staffordshire on 11th December 1994. This year, 15+°C was reported in the South-east.

Total rainfall for December 2023 came to 121mm – only the 5th time December has recorded 100mm or more this century – whilst October has recorded 100mm+ on 9 occasions. The wettest December was in 2012 with 128mm and the driest was in 2010 with 19mm – and two other Decembers with totals in the 20mm's. But December 2023 now comes ahead of 14 other Decembers which recorded fewer than 121mm.

Following the two frosts at the beginning of the month there came a spell of 4 days which yielded 23mm – almost an inch of rain. It began on Sunday 3rd with snow, which turned quickly to rain as warmer weather arrived, with 7.5mm overnight and a dull damp day on Monday 4th. After a bright day, following a frost on Wednesday 6th, there came a very wet and windy day on Thursday 7th with 10mm of rain – Storm Elin which was followed quickly by Storm Fergus on 9th and 10th bringing more wind and rain totalling 16mm but a rise in temperature to 9°C.

After a further 10mm of rain on 12th and 13th, we had the longest dry spell of the month – five days with temperatures just getting into double figures. Then 11mm of rain on Tuesday 19th began a succession of roughly alternate wet and dry days until Storm Gerrit on 27th December with very strong winds and half an inch (12.5mm) of rain. After a dry day on Thursday 28th, the last three days again produced heavy rain, especially overnight on 30th giving rise to brief flooding across the road at Church End. I had to resort to my Wellies!

Those three named storms, although severe and seriously damaging in more exposed areas of the country, caused little disruption here.

Total rainfall for the year came to 718mm which after a rather 'slow' start proved a more respectable total among the 24 years under consideration.

The wettest month was December with its 121mm followed by July with 116mm and October with 103mm. The driest month was February with 6mm (!) but it was followed by March with 92mm.


From wettest to driest, this century so far, average rainfall for the months came out as follows:

November - 79.3mm; October - 79.0mm; August - 71.3mm;

December - 66.5mm; January - 64.6mm; July - 64.5mm; May - 58.7mm;


