

Roads through our Parishes

I am told that everybody knows the history of the Welsh Road, the old drovers road (for cattle), dating from at least medieval times and documented from the 1700's, that winds through our Parishes and runs from North Wales to the lucrative South East of England, where the cattle were fattened and slaughtered to feed the townies. Herds, some as big as 300, were driven by gangs of up to ten drovers with corgi 'sheep' dogs covering 10 miles a day. In the early 1800's the drovers were paid a shilling a day with most of it no doubt being spent in pubs like the Roebuck in Priors Marston. The roads were tracks with wide verges to allow for the cattle to graze along the way. But we all know about this road so no more.

Before the Romans arrived in Britain in 43 AD, with four legions and under the orders of Emperor Claudius to conquer our nation and name it Britannia, there were no roads in England, simply tracks linking one settlement to another. But, as part of their conquest, they built roads and by the end of 43 AD had set up a stronghold in Colchester and had got as far as Dorset the following year. By 48 AD, they ran the area from the Humber estuary in the north to the Severn estuary in the west, using military roads that they built such as Ermine Street linking Colchester and London to York and the Fosse Way, from Gloucester to Leicester and beyond, with Icknield Street linking it to Wales to allow for the invasion of Wales. By 60 AD, they had conquered Anglesey and by 100 AD, had built 8000 miles of roads in England, then extending the network to Hadrian's Wall, which was built in 120 AD. The Fosse Way, Watling Street and Ermine Street are all close to our parishes.

The Romans left us in 410 AD, with an excellent road network (London to York is 200 miles and took 5 days along Ermine street) and we let the network fall into disrepair (a bit like County Councils and potholes today – no money to pay for repairs and no incentives to make the spend a priority!).

Then, in the 1300's, Pavage Grants were available, initially to pave market places, and then, through 'letters patent', to provide roads and maintain them through the use of tolls. In Tudor times, the maintenance of roads became the responsibility of each Parish, which was good for the roads used by the parishioners, but did not lead to a road network for long distance transport of goods. Britain was becoming more industrialized in the 1700's, but transporting coal from the mines and goods to the markets was becoming increasingly difficult, because of the poor quality of the through-roads. The first Turnpike Act was passed in 1663, which set up 'not for profit' road trusts, with a maximum fee for tolls to allow for the building of toll roads with a turnpike gate at each end for the collection of tolls. By 1830, there were 1000 trusts with 30,000 miles of roads under their control and by 1838 they were collecting £1.5million in tolls each year (with debts of £7 million to pay for land purchasing etc.). The Parish Councils were still responsible for all other roads in the Parish. We have turnpike roads close to our parishes such as:

- The river crossing at Stratford and the linking roads which were toll roads from 1744;
- The road from Banbury to Coventry that passed through Southam which was a toll road from 1755;
- The road from Banbury to Daventry which became a toll road in 1865 amongst others.

Due to the cost of tolls, and the need for better transport, canals and then railways became more important than the toll roads and in 1844 responsibility for roads was taken away from the Parish Councils and moved to a Roads Board run by each County Council. Toll roads slowly declined and were gradually incorporated into the County-Council-run roads network.

The government did take some interest in roads and after the Scottish rebellion of 1745, it built many military roads in Scotland to keep the population under control and between 1815 and 1826 Thomas Telford built a military road from London to Holyhead to enable the army to get to Ireland and control the Irish more efficiently.

Later, in 1958, the Government opened Britain's first motorway, the Preston Bypass in Lancashire, that ran for 8 miles and is now part of the M6. In 1959, the first section of the M1 between St Albans and Rugby opened and is now extended to 230 miles ending at Hook Moor near Leeds. The M40, which was hacked through our lovely Warwickshire countryside, was opened in 1967 and the M6 (the longest motorway at 236 miles from M1 Junction 19 to Gretna Green) was finished in 1971.

We do have some historic roads running through our Parishes other than the Welsh Road. In the Iron Age, Droitwich was situated on a large salt deposit and brine springs brought the salt to the surface with the water being far more salty than sea water and second only to the Dead Sea in its salt concentration. The salt was 'harvested' from the natural salt springs by the iron Age people in what is now the centre of Droitwich and was transported and traded across the Midlands. When the Romans arrived, they industrialized the process and Droitwich became a major centre for salt production, which declined in the 1800's and the last salt works closed in 1922. However, a new salt works has now been established at Churchfield Farm which now markets 'Droitwich Salt' as the only brine spring salt in the UK. Our Parishes lie on the Salt Road between Droitwich and Northampton. The route would have gone from Droitwich to Stratford to Priors Hardwick then to Priors Marston (where no doubt the salt men would have stopped at the Roebuck!) and then eastwards up Marston Hill, across the Hellidon golf course to Hellidon and across to the Badby – Catesby road and then on the Northampton. A lovely walk on a nice day.

FROM YOUR DISTRICT COUNCILLORS FOR BISHOP'S ITCHINGTON, FENNY COMPTON AND NAPTON WARD

A slightly extended report this month, as it has been a year since we were elected as your District Councillors. It has been a very busy first year for us, and to summarise some of the highlights:

May 2023

- Local elections on 4 May 2023.
- A change of political control at the District council to the new Liberal Democrat administration with formal hand over on 24 May 2023.

June 2023

 Stratford on Avon District Council opens the process for applications for Infrastructure Projects through the UK Shared Prosperity Fund (UKSPF) and Rural England Prosperity Fund (REPF) and invites eligible local organisations to submit expressions of interest for the second round of funding allocation.

July 2023

- Tom Heap, BBC Countryfile presenter, attends Napton's Ecofair along with Nigel and Susan Juned.
- Cabinet agrees to re-introduce a Concessionary Parking Permit for state pension aged District residents.

August 2023

 Community Infrastructure Levy (CIL) Spending Round for Stratford-on-Avon District is now open for applications for funding towards infrastructure projects and improvements.

September 2023

• Cabinet agrees to support the designation of an area north of Stratford, called Lench Meadows, as a Local Nature Reserve and to be managed for wildlife for the long-term future.

October 2023

- Planning Advisory Service team visit takes place with the aim of improving the Council's planning service.
- Concessionary parking permit scheme for residents of state pension age goes live.
- Cabinet agrees the final list of projects to be funded by the Shared Prosperity Fund (SPF) and the Rural England Prosperity Fund (REPF). Thirty seven community projects across the District are granted funding.

November 2023

 Cabinet approves a process for assessing and distributing resources of the Community Climate Change Fund. An opportunity for parish councils, as well as properly constituted community and charity groups to apply for grant funding for green initiatives in their local community. • Podback recycling scheme is launched.

December 2023

 Full Council adopts a new Council Plan for 2023-2027. We aim to be recognised as a leader for supporting the health and wellbeing of our residents, protecting our environment, delivering sustainability, and innovation. The Council Plan may be found on the District Council's website by putting 'Council Plan' into the search box.

January 2024

- The new administration's budget proposals come out for public consultation.
- Cabinet approves new medical and community facilities in Upper Lighthorne.
- Community Climate Change Fund goes live.
- Cabinet agrees to allocate Community Infrastructure Levy funds to five projects across the District. Fenny Compton Sports Pavilion and Playground project is one of the successful bids.

February 2024

- The Council's budget is set with no cuts to services. This includes funds for the Rural Crime Advisers and funds to support the UBUS service. Funds have also been set aside for the District Council to investigate the use of waste vegetable oil in their refuse truck fleet, which can cut carbon emissions by up to ninety per cent.
- Stratford on Avon District Council's Rural Crime Advisers win a Neighbourhood Policing Award from Warwickshire Police.
- Stratford-on-Avon District Council expands online access to its meetings. All public meetings can be viewed as Council Meeting Webcasts on the District Council's website or as recordings on the Youtube channel.

March 2024

- Corporate Peer Challenge takes place with the aim of improving the Council's work.
- Residents in Stratford-on-Avon District are still some of the best recyclers in England, as the District Council reaches 5th in the top ten Councils for reuse, recycling and composting.
- New Grounds Maintenance Contact for the District Council. Please read about this in more detail below.

And our report for this month:

New Grounds Maintenance Contract

Following a successful tender exercise, Stratford-on-Avon District Council has awarded a new contract to carry out grounds maintenance across the District from 1 April 2024.

The five-year contract has been awarded to Continental Landscapes Ltd, with the option to extend for up to a further five years.

The contract covers all District Council owned and maintained parks and open spaces covering grassed areas, floral beds, shrub beds/herbaceous beds, hedge maintenance, tree watering, weed control and removal.

The contract also includes park cleansing, park furniture and play equipment maintenance, the maintenance of the paddling pool at the Recreation Ground, together with lifebuoys maintenance along the River Avon in Stratford-upon-Avon and winter gritting.

The new contract includes Key Performance Indicators and Annual Contract Targets to drive service improvements, as well as introducing new features such as 'No Mow May' on Warwickshire County Council Highway verges.

Another change is that herbicides will **not** be applied to any grassed areas, floral beds, shrub beds/herbaceous beds or hedges, as part of the weed control, it will be limited to hard surfaces and spot treatments of invasive weeds and wildflower areas only.

Continental Landscapes Ltd will also be using HVO fuel, from second generation biofuel and a RTFO accredited supplier, for their vehicles, together with electric equipment.

Community Safety

Stratford-on-Avon District Council is carrying out a 7-week Public Space Protection Order (PSPO) consultation in Stratford-upon-Avon town centre.

A Public Space Protection Order (PSPO) is a control measure created by the 2014 Anti-Social Behaviour, Crime and Policing Act. The orders deal with specific nuisances or problems in a defined area that are 'detrimental to the community's quality of life' and are designed to tackle anti-social behaviour in public places.

The District Council is consulting on the following condition:

• Anti-social behaviour anywhere within 'Stratford-upon-Avon Town Centre' when consuming or possessing alcohol.

The behaviour which the District Council is looking to prohibit has been identified as detrimental, persistent and unreasonable to the area. It will not stop members of the public from drinking in public. It will, however, allow the police officers and police community support officers additional powers to deal with those who are drinking or

possessing alcohol and engaging in anti-social behaviour. Residents are invited to comment via SDC's website (link below) and the consultation runs until 8 May. https://www.stratford.gov.uk/community-safety/stratford-upon-avon-pspo-consultation.cfm

Home Upgrade Grant (HUG)

The income eligibility criteria for Home Upgrade Grant - phase 2 (HUG2) funding has increased to £36,000 a year. Some residents, who may not have applied previously because they were over the first £31,000 threshold, may now be eligible.

Even though we are now entering the warmer months, residents are encouraged to apply for grants as soon as possible, because there is a 3-6 month time frame from application to installation. Apply now to be warm NEXT winter.

Stratford-on-Avon District Council works alongside local energy experts Act on Energy, to help administer all winter warmth grant funding. There are many types of funding - to read more about them and how to apply, you can look on the Act on Energy website or contact them direct on via phone 0800 988 2881 or email advice@actonenergy.org.uk

PALM SUNDAY-24th MARCH

WEATHER JOTTINGS MARCH 2024

March 2024 continued the theme of warm and wet. The total rainfall came to 89mm, making it the third wettest March this century, after 2018 with 131mm and last year with 92mm. The driest March was in 2011 with 2.5mm with 2011 not far behind with 6mm. The total for the year so far is 280mm making it the fourth wettest year, to the end of March, this century. Ten years ago, in 2014, we'd received 376mm by the end of March, thanks to 204mm in January that year - for which the final total was 900mm. 2018 was the year of THE BEAST FROM THE EAST, when, during March, the snow arriving from the East came level with the top of the hedges along the Welsh Road between Church End and the Boddington crossroads......and the WCC snow plough had to be rescued by a local tractor! What a difference 6 years can make!!

The first half of the month was relatively dry, with 7mm falling on Friday 1st, then no more rain until the weekend of 9th and 10th, with 12mm over the two days. Then on 14th and 15th, we received a further 5.5mm.


Sunday 17th brought 14mm and ten of the remaining fourteen days brought more rain, the wettest being Tuesday 26th with 15mm. Storm Nelson was above and around us over 27th and 28th, with a couple of claps of thunder during the afternoon of 28th.

Temperatures for the first eleven days of the month remained between 8° C and 10° C and the first four days began with a frost. These were, however, fine sunny days. On Tuesday 12^{th} , the temperature rose to 12° C and then to 15° C for 15^{th} and 16^{th} .

Sunday 17th marked the change to wetter, slightly warmer weather for the rest of the month, with temporary lower temperatures accompanying the heavy storms just before Easter, thanks to Storm Nelson. On Good Friday, when I happened to be in the car, I noticed a drop of 2°C during one good storm. But on Sunday 17th, I noticed the first Brimstone butterfly.

March did come in gently, like a lamb, and went out a bit like a lion, with the storm and strong winds. March 2024 was generally the warmest March on record – as were the previous nine months.

GARDEN JOTTINGS FROM BRIDGE NURSERY

Your local Hardy Plant Specialists

The first three months of this year have caused me to be constantly grumbling about the excess amount of rain and lack of sunshine. Let's hope that the next few months don't swing the other way, so that we are all desperate for some gentle summer showers. One way to help alleviate this is to mulch the borders with compost to help keep the moisture from evaporating. I have six, yes six, compost bins and put a mixture of leaves, grass cuttings, peelings, manure if I can get it and spent compost from the nursery in layers. Avoid using any seeding weeds or you will have them all over the garden. It gets turned once and then maybe nine months later it is ready to barrow into the garden.

Jobs include:

- Apply lawn fertiliser
- Plant bedding plants later in the month
- Sow seeds of sweet corn, cucumbers and courgettes, also runner beans
- Plant out cauliflowers and summer cabbages
- Put rose fertiliser round roses
- Now is a good time to freshen up house plants by re-potting them with new compost and, later in the month have them outside
- Keep an eye out for ladybirds and relocate them to any greenfly which you might have
- There are so many slugs around after the perfect conditions for them earlier this year. Try using nematodes to control them rather than slug pellets, much more ecological.

The garden here is open for the NGS each weekend through until the end of September. Donations amounted to £1800 last year for this wonderful charity. I hope you can visit and say hello.

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
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
