



FROM YOUR DISTRICT COUNCILLORS FOR BISHOP'S ITCHINGTON, FENNY COMPTON AND NAPTON WARD

Severn Trent

Nigel has been keeping in touch with Severn Trent over recent months, as various renewals have proceeded around Napton and Shuckburgh, and also from Rugby. Whilst the work to avoid future disruptions due to bursts and low pressure is needed, much disruption has been involved. Not all of the work has been done in a way that has been the best for local residents and businesses. Nigel has been asking for a meeting with Severn Trent which took place on 10 September. Nigel and Napton Parish Councillor Ian Williams heard about the remaining work to cross under the canal at Holt Road (this might be delayed until next spring) and a new ancillary pump at the top of Napton hill (for which timing was unknown). We raised concerns about signage, road closures, diversions and damage to verges and ditches. Wider area work to the supply pipe from Kites Hardwick continues, whilst locally the pipe renewal from Napton to Shuckburgh also continues, but we have been promised better monitoring of the highway traffic control on the A425 and improved signage for any future work.

Winter Fuel Allowance

There has been much publicity about the cut to payment of winter fuel allowance, which will now only be paid to pensioners on low incomes, mainly those who get pension credit. Nationally, an estimated 880,000 eligible pensioners don't claim pension credit who could. You can check if you are eligible on the government's web site:

Annual Canvass

Stratford-on-Avon District residents are being urged to check their electoral registration details or risk losing their chance to vote on decisions that affect them.

The annual canvass allows Stratford-on-Avon District Council to keep the electoral register up to date, to identify who risks losing their voice at elections, and to encourage them to register before it's too late.

If you're not currently registered, your name will not appear in the messages we send. If you want to register, the easiest way is <u>online at www.gov.uk/register-to-vote.</u>

Recent home-movers in particular are urged to check their details. Electoral Commission research has found that recent home-movers are less likely to be registered than those who have lived at the same address for a long time. In Great Britain, 92% of those who have lived in their home for 16 years will be registered, compared with 36% of people who have lived at an address for less than a year.

THE CEDAR TREE



We very much regret having to close off the North side of the churchyard of St Leonard's Church in Priors Marston.

The recent branch fall is the third in the last two years. It occurred when there was neither the weight of snow on the branches nor a strong wind. Therefore, we have had to take measures to reduce the chances of a further fall endangering lives.

We have applied to the County authorities for a formal inspection and assessment, but at the time of writing there has been no response. We are looking at all possible ways of overcoming this problem.

May we respectfully remind you not to walk along either of the paths. If you do so, it is at your own risk.

Priors Marston Parish Church Council (PCC)

FROM THE CHURCH OF ST MARY THE VIRGIN

The Patronal Festival This was a great success, and we received many comments of appreciation. The actual date of the birth of the Virgin Mary is celebrated on 8th September, thus this year falling on the day itself. Our church bells were re-hung in 1924 but we're not sure of the precise date – probably a bit later in the year, as the bill was only paid on 31st December 1924! 45 people attended the service.

The service was in three parts: Firstly, the celebration of our Patron Saint, for which we used a shortened form of the Evensong Service. This service was first devised by Archbishop Cranmer in 1549 then updated by King Charles II in1662. Our oldest bell was cast in 1560 and the other two were cast in 1670 in Cropredy, so our bells were 'in tune' with the language we were using. This part of the service involved a lot of participation from the congregation and, with the service sheets, this went very well. It was wonderful to have so many people actively engaged and we read the last prayer together as well!

The second part of the service was the celebration of the bells – as well, of course, of the ringing before and after the service, for which we are very grateful for the help of people outside the village, now that Paul Hobday is now the only village person fit and strong enough. The handbell ringers were with us and they had already learnt the tune for a bellringers' hymn, but on this occasion and after a couple of practices, the organ joined the handbells – and so did the congregation! I think that must have been a 'First' in the history of our church, if not in the Diocese! Paul gave us information about the history of the bells, and their different notes, as reported in last month's magazine, then we heard a poem on 'The Bells of long ago', offered prayers for bells, bellringers and those they call, followed by the final hymn 'Now thank we all our God' to end the service.

The third part was the refreshments – using our new area – and during this time Christopher Hodgson gave a brief resume of the work which had been done recently inside and outside the church, and the next project which is to provide a water supply to the church. There was also a display of items relevant to the history of the bells, including details of the estimate for the re-hanging - (transport to and from the re-hanging works in Kidlington, by rail via Fenny Compton station) and a small piece of wood from the wheel of the Treble bell which had broken while being rung for a wedding in 2001!

Our next 'special' celebration will be the **Harvest Festival**, on **Sunday 13**th **October** For this service we shall follow the same order of service as in past years, with

several people taking part – and of course the popular Harvest Festival hymns! We shall decorate the church with flowers and invite you to donate harvest gifts of dry food, tins and packets which will be taken to the food bank in Southam, in due course. The Food Bank tends to become overwhelmed with gifts from many Harvest Festivals in and around Southam and storage space is limited, but don't let that reduce your enthusiasm – given time, we can cope!!!

<u>The Churchyard</u> Once again, our sincere thanks to the volunteers who have kept the churchyard in such wonderful condition during the past month. It really is a privilege to see the churchyard in such good condition. There are, however, small tasks that could also make a difference such as removing the ivy which is appearing on a few headstones, and tidying the very small areas where even the smallest mower can't go!! Please feel free!

The Interregnum At the time of writing, we are considering a different approach. We have been offered some financial support from the Diocese if we advertise for a stipendiary priest. This would increase our costs, of course, but not massively, and we'd be likely to attract better applicants. Several unknown factors are also attached to this plan. So, please watch this space!

<u>Donations in the phone box</u> This has produced some amazing surprises during the past month! Although the Food Bank can only accept items which are well in date, any which arrive by mistake can be found a home elsewhere.

<u>Used Stamps</u> And still the stamps arrive!! Thank you all so much. I'm so fortunate to have a friend in Byfield who is always ready to trim and sort them – UK from foreign, so sending them off is no great effort! Were on our way to filling the next A4 envelope!!



NATURE NOTES

Well, autumn has arrived - as I write this it is the middle of September - and the temperature outside has not yet reached 10°C!!

Many of you will be aware that I belong to a small group who have studied Curlews in this area under the guidance of the national group The Curlew Recovery Project. This initiative came to our attention when the Banbury Ornithological Society became involved a couple of years ago, in order to try to improve the fortunes of the Curlew making nesting attempts in the countryside around Banburyshire. Follow the links following this article for further information.

In early spring, Curlew return inland, from the coast where they have spent the winter on mudflats, where ice and snow have not prevented them digging for food. They look for nesting sites in grassland, which in the Cherwell valley are often fields in the river floodplain. Around us, they have made nesting attempts in the permanent grassland either being grazed or grown to cut for silage.

Over the last couple of years, a small group of birdwatchers have variously heard or seen Curlew half way along the road between here and Napton, down in the valley below the village of Priors Hardwick – sadly rather close to the HS2 working at Lower Radbourne, along the canal towpath between Marston Doles and the Folly at Napton and along the road between Marston Doles and Chapel Green.

In 2022, a pair chose a field along the Doles Road to nest in and the farmer kindly allowed us to place an electric fence around the nest, which successfully protected it from predators and three chicks fledged. This year, Curlews were seen and heard far and wide during early surveys, then as time drew closer to the nesting season (usually in April) a pair were seen displaying in fields near the canal and also chasing off a fox, which may indicate that they had started nesting there. Then, after many hours watching and waiting, birds were again observed chasing Crows (again a sign they have chosen a nest site) further up the road closer to Napton. We watched with a telescope from a suitable distance and were pretty sure we knew exactly where the nest was located in the grass, but sadly, when we came back to fence the nest, it held 2 eggs, but they had been eaten, the nest cup was scraped out and the eggs smashed.

Although birds were seen around for several weeks afterwards, we do not think there were any further nesting attempts. We shall have to wait for next summer to see if birds return and try again anywhere nearby.

WEATHER JOTTINGS AUGUST 2024

Total rainfall for August 2024 was 54mm – somewhat below the average for the month this century, which is 68.5mm. For the first fifteen years of this century, it was 70mm. The wettest August was in 2004 with 168mm of rain – the wettest month of all since 1998. The driest August was in 2003 with 8.5mm and next came August last year with 12mm.

Most of the rain, 33.5mm, fell during the first half of the month, but this only affected five days. The month began with 1 mm of rain early in the day, but this was followed by a thunderstorm between 6.30 and 7.15pm.

Most of the 25mm of rain fell during the first 30 minutes. It was truly torrential! We had a further 2.5mm on Tuesday 6th, with the remaining 5mm coming on three days during the week beginning Sunday 11th.


The second half of the month brought 20.5mm, and 14mm of this fell on Saturday 24th from the early hours until about 1.00pm. This was the tail-end of Storm Lilian which didn't turn out to be as disruptive as had been anticipated. Nevertheless, it did give us a

few rather windy days, which at this time of year, with most trees still in full leaf, can cause problems. The remaining rainfall came in 4 mm over 19th and 20th, 2mm on Friday, 23rd and 0.5mm of light rain early on Wednesday 28th.

Temperatures on the whole were disappointing. August began with three warm, sunny days at 25°C and 26°C. Then we had to wait until Sunday 11th for 25°C again and that was followed by Monday 12th at 28°C and Tuesday 13th at 26°C. Then, once again, we were back to levels below 25°C. The second half of the month was even cooler – below 25°C from Wednesday 21st until Sunday 25th, with only 17°C on Saturday 24th. Wednesday 28th saw 24°C but then temperatures fell away again until 20°C on Saturday 31st. Summer had come in very small doses!

The official comment on the weather from the Met Office for summer 2024 was that it was the coolest the UK has seen in nearly a decade. The average summer temperature was 14.37° C, as northerly winds brought cold Arctic air to the country. This is 0.22° C below the UK long-term average between 1991 and 2020. The last time the average summer temperature was this low was in 2015. In spite of the rather grey weather, the UK had 5% less rainfall than average, although Scotland was particularly wet and England rather dry.

GARDEN JOTTINGS FROM BRIDGE NURSERY

Gardening to encourage wildlife is something I'm often speaking about, but the time has come when I've reached my limits. The appearance of a pair of roe deer has capped any issues with slugs, snails and rabbits. They are extremely destructive and are nibbling their way through the plants quite determinedly. Apparently, there are just five different plants which aren't to their liking. Fencing the site isn't an option, but I will try everything else I possibly can, including waving my arms and swearing loudly at them whenever I see them. Any suggestions to deter them will be most welcome.

Meanwhile, I have almost done my bulb order and will have fritillaries, camassia, alliums and anemones to pot up ready for spring/summer sales next year.

I hear the phrase 'putting the garden to bed' quite often. My approach is that this is a time to get a lot done right through the winter, if the weather is okay. It can be such a good time to prune, plant new plants, move things, remove things and divide things. The soil will be warm, roots can get established and there is generally less clutter, meaning you can see what needs to be done more easily. Happy autumn/winter gardening everyone!


