I'm worried about how I will manage without the Winter Fuel Payment. What can I do?

On July 29th the Government announced that the Winter Fuel Payment - of £200 for those aged 65-79, and £300 for those aged 80 or over - will be restricted to those people in receipt of Pension Credit – so what is Pension Credit and who can claim it? It is estimated that up to 880,000 households are entitled to Pension Credit but not currently receiving it.

Pension Credit

Is a means tested benefit which is paid to help with the cost of living, it can also bring entitlement to additional financial support, including housing benefit, Council tax support, and winter fuel payment. Pension Credit can be backdated by up to 3 months (subject to meeting qualifying criteria).

The deadline to claim to be entitled to this year's winter fuel payment is 21** December 2024

11.11.11 - TIME TO REMEMBER

It is almost the 11th hour of the 11th day of the 11th month, when the guns grew silent in 1918 marking the end of the Great War of 1914 – 1918 ('the war to end all wars'), when we celebrate the lives that were lost together with those who have perished in the various conflicts around the world and wonder why it was not 'the war to end all wars'.

In Priors Marston, we meet around the war memorial on The Green which lists the names of the residents of our village who signed up to fight for their country and did not return. The memorial was built in 1922 by workmen who were constructing Edward Master's house on Byfield Road then called Villa Nova and now Marston House.

The memorial simply lists the names of those who died, not mentioning their date of birth, date of death, rank or regiment as most war memorials do.

The memorial lists 11 names, 7 of whom served in the Royal Warwickshire Regiment, which ran recruitment meetings on The Green at the start of the war and was our local regiment, having been based in Warwick from 1873. During the First World War, it raised 31 battalions consisting of 47,500 men of whom 11,500 died during the four years of conflict.

These seven were:-

Frank Moore who lived at The Mill and was one of the first to enlist at a regimental recruiting meeting on The Green in September 1914. He was a Private in the 2nd Battalion Royal Warwickshire Regiment and landed in France on 17th July 1915. He was killed in action on Saturday 2nd September 1915 in the Battle of Loos and his name is listed on the Loos Memorial in the Pas De Calais. His body was never recovered and he has no known grave.

Robert Baldwin who lived in a now-demolished cottage that backed onto the south churchyard wall, died of natural causes whilst still under training with the Royal Warwickshire Regiment.

Jim Smith from the Old Manor Cottage was killed in 1916. His brother also 'joined up', survived the war and came safely home.

Harry Burbidge who lived at the south end of The Orchards, which was then a row of terrace houses, was also killed in France in 1916.

Arthur Parker of Westwood Downs, Keys Lane did not make it to the front, but was killed during the 10 weeks of training that took place in England before the soldiers were posted to the front.

Tom Coling of the Bakery caught pneumonia in the trenches whilst serving in France and died of the disease.

Edward (Eddie) Henry Cornish was born in January 1892 in Forest Gate. By 1911, he was living at Weddington House in Bishops Itchington, where he was a page. His parents, Henry and Caroline Cornish, were living at Lark Rise, Priors Marston when he enlisted as a Private in 11th Battalion Royal Warwickshire Regiment in August 1914 at the Rugby recruitment office.

Eddie was killed on 23rd April 1917 aged 23. He died in what is known as the Battle of the Scarfe, part of the Battle of Arras, south of Gravelle. He is remembered on the Arras Memorial, together with 34,798 more British dead. His mother Caroline moved to Sulgrave, Banbury following the death of her husband Henry.

The remaining four names :-

Harold Olorenshaw was a civil servant living in London in 1915 and so joined the London Rifles. His country home was Westwood House in School Lane, Priors Marston. He was born in 1889 and had three siblings. The family was living in Northfield Farm on the Shuckburgh Road between 1891 and 1901. He enlisted in the London Rifles on 2nd September 1915 and married Muriel Wood of Colwyn Bay on his first leave. He was rapidly promoted to corporal and then to lance-sergeant in the 5th Battalion London Rifle Brigade. On 1st July 1916, he took part in the Battle for Eck Trench, a German stronghold in Gommecourt, France. Sergeant Olorenshaw was wounded, taken prisoner by the Germans and moved to La Cateau in Nord Par De Calais. He died of his wounds on Tuesday 18th July 1916. On that one day, 1,336 British soldiers died. Harold is buried in the La Cateau Military Cemetery in Northern France. His wife Muriel was living in Priors Marston at the time of his death. **Amos Bull** was born in Priors Marston to James and Bertha Bull. He enlisted as a Private (service number 12069) in the Oxfordshire and Buckinghamshire Light Infantry at their recruitment centre in Banbury. At the time, he lived at Hill Farm and was an engine shed cleaner at Woodford. He died of gunshot wounds to the back and abdomen on 6th June 1916 at age 21. He has a grave in the Lijssenthook Military cemetery in Belgium together with 10,786 other British dead.

Thomas (Tommy) Hart, whose parents were Thomas and Ann Hart, was called up in 1918 to the Royal Field Artillery as Gunner Hart, but later transferred to the Labour Corps. This was a unit, formed in 1917, for men not healthy enough to serve at the front and undertook manual work for the army both in the UK and France. By the end of the war, the Corps consisted of some 380,000 men. Tommy died in 1920 from a disease (possibly TB) caught whilst on active service and he has an official War Grave in the southwest corner of the graveyard in Priors Marston.

Phillip Earnest Lea was born in Priors Marston in 1894 to George and Ellen Lea, who were smallholders living in St Leonard's Cottage. He was called up in 1917 to the Coldstream Guards and became Guardsman 21364 Lea. He was killed, age 25, by a sniper on 27th August 1918, during the Second Battle of the Somme. On that day, his battalion was ordered to attack a 1500 yard front near Croisilles including Banks Trench. They began the attack at 7am, but met stiff resistance, eventually forcing the enemy out more than 12 hours later allowing the battalion to achieve their objective. However, success came at a heavy cost of 344 casualties, including Guardsman Lea. He is buried in the Croisilles British Cemetery in the Pas De Calais.

Community Climate Change Fund

The Second Phase of the Community Climate Change Fund (CCCF) is now open. Expressions of interest may be made up until Friday 17 January 2025.

The following groups will be able to apply for grant funding through the CCCF:

- Town or Parish Councils
- Formally constituted charity and community groups

The CCCF will consider funding projects which meet one of the following criteria:

- Projects which result in a direct reduction of greenhouse gas emissions
- Projects which build resilience to the impacts of climate change
- Projects which will result in research enabling access to more significant funding applications

Road Diversions

Lately, work to install new sewers (and thus unrelated to HS2) has closed the Welsh Road just outside Southam, with consequent diversions affecting our villages. The full closure is due to finish on 28 October then 3-way lights until mid-November.

We pressed for a meeting with HS2 and their contractors EKFB about the continuing, planned and confusing road closures around Southam, Priors and Wormleighton. This took place earlier at the end of September with Nigel, a County Councillor and the MP. HS2 seemed to be listening and have gone away to review what they intend. We also asked that the diversions and road closure around Southam and the associated signage should be looked at.

New Customer Access Terminal

The District Council has been working to improve access for residents. Whilst many people can use the internet and phone, sometimes face to face enquiries and discussions can help. For people who live nearer to Stratford town, there are service desks for residents to talk to customer service advisors, in-person. This has not been convenient for residents here. The Council has now installed a 'Customer Access Terminal' in Southam Library, where local residents with enquires can talk

face to face to an advisor over a screen linked to the offices in Stratford, avoiding the need for a long trip. Enquiries relating to council tax, benefits and housing can now be dealt with locally in Southam. Operational hours are:

Police

There was a recent public police liaison meeting on the subject of speeding. There was concern about levels of enforcement, lack of speed cameras, coordination with highway measures, data availability and general resourcing. These are issues that have cropped up at Parish council meetings from time in villages across our patch. The Police 101 telephone response times came in for criticism.

Whilst noting the previous topic, by coincidence, other news items have emerged. Firstly, the Police and Crime Commissioner has announced they will look at average speed cameras across the county. There was also the unexpected announcement during the month of the decision by Chief Constable Debbie Tedds to retire with immediate effect. Deputy Chief Constable Alex Franklin-Smith will fill the role on an interim basis.

Secondly, the Police and Crime Commissioner has also announced a survey. Some of us have been of the opinion for some time that our area is under-resourced, especially in respect of accounting for our rurality. We hear a number of other concerns, so we would encourage people to take part please. The announcement is as follows:

A new virtual reality programme will be used across Warwickshire to educate young people on the realities of carrying a knife and how they might become pressured into doing so. The knife crime programme specifically helps young people explore the dangers and potential consequences of "carrying" without "telling" them what to do.

A launch event took place at the end of September, which Natalie attended, and saw a number of statutory organisations, including schools and community groups come together to experience the programme first hand.

Government Planning Reforms and the South Warwickshire Local Plan

Both Warwick and Stratford District Councils have responded to the Government's Consultation on reforms to the planning system. There is a great deal of technical detail (Stratford's response ran to 91 pages), but one main concern is that our local plan process is not thrown out and much time and money wasted. At the present time, it looks like that won't happen as long as we adhere to the timetable we have set, which would see the plan submitted to the government in summer 2026.

Our Services

<u>A double Baptism!</u>

Two great-grandchildren of Mrs Liddy Wilson who used to live in St Mary's Close, Seth and Faye, were baptised by our Area Dean Rev Andy Batchelor, on Sunday 13th October. Almost 70 people attended this wonderfully happy event. The children had chosen 3 hymns which they all knew very well and we had a really good sing. Our Baptisms Register, which dates from 1898, records the baptisms of the children's mothers, grandmother and great-grandmother! And the brass ewer (huge jug!) from which the water was poured into the font is dated 1890.

Harvest Festival

Later that same day, we held our Harvest Festival Service and again the church was full. The handbell ringers played some well-known hymn tunes, ending with the "We plough the fields" as an introduction to the service and from then it flowed seamlessly through the order of service, with various people leading and the congregation responding positively and firmly each time. We sang lustily the well-known harvest hymns accompanied as usual by Dr Gerard Hyland on the organ. In all, almost 70 people attended and then enjoyed refreshments afterwards. The collection amounted to over £300, from which we shall send a donation to the Farming Community Network for which we prayed in our prayers of intercession. Our very grateful thanks go to the handbell ringers, those who decorated the church, who provided, served and cleared up after the refreshments and to all who took part in any way to make this such a happy village event.

November Services

In addition to our routine services in November, we shall be holding our service of Remembrance at the War Memorial on the village green at 9.00am on Sunday 10th November. A wreath will be laid on behalf of the village and the Last Post will be sounded. Our monthly service of Evensong will be held at 5.00pm around the same subject.

The church building

We now have a new set of chairs for the community area at the back of the church, together with a rack on which to store them and, below, a box containing cushions as the seats are a bit hard!!!

Regarding the next stage of Project Enable, meetings are now being arranged with Severn Trent, the contractor who would lay the connecting pipe into the church, JMT Engineering of Ladbroke, and our architect Bryan Martin. We shall then need to involve the Diocese for a Faculty to begin the work.

And, while on the subject of the building, many thanks to all those who clean the church and do flowers week by week throughout the year: your efforts are very much appreciated!

WEATHER JOTTINGS SEPTEMBER 2024

One glance at the grid will confirm what we all knew was likely to be the final result of September rainfall this year. In Priors Hardwick, it was the wettest month this century and since I began my records in 1998. It was in fact the dreadful floods all around this area in April that year, which prompted me to report the weather in the magazine. The centre of Leamington was badly flooded and some friends of mine who lived in Cubbington had to be rehomed elsewhere for several months until their home was fit again for human habitation. The total rainfall that month was 154mm, but it didn't hold the record for long. July 2007 yielded 160mm but in August 2004 we had already received 168mm.

The total for September 2024 was 231mm! Most of that fell from late afternoon on Saturday 21st – very heavy rain, which continued through the night – with thunder – and only relented to light drizzle through most of Sunday. It then rained heavily through Sunday night and all through Monday 23rd. At 10.00pm on that evening, I had to brave the weather to empty my rain gauge as it was ready to overflow – 56mm –over two inches – since that morning! The total for those two and a quarter days was 156mm – just a bit more than for the whole of April 1998! But this time flooding, in this area, was much less of a problem. Perhaps WCC Highways Department have made some lasting improvements to the drains!


Average rainfall for September from 1998-2008 was 70mm; from 2000 – 2022 it was 54mm. So this year, we've had over 4 times the average for this century! In 2011 the total for the whole year was 396mm!

The first half of the month brought 25mm of rain, with one very heavy storm on the evening of Thursday 12th resulting in a double rainbow. Even the two wettest days brought only 6mm each. The last week of the month brought 50mm – just below the average for the whole of September so far this century – but it didn't seem extreme!!

Temperatures for the month were generally above average, beginning with 22°C and 23°C on the first two days, then dropping for a couple of days to 17°C and 18°C, before recovering conveniently for the weekend of 7th and 8th. There was another brief reminder of summer between 14th and 18th, with

some lovely weather, but nevertheless, only 18°C. There was a frost on Friday 13th and again, on Friday 27th, but only visible on grass verges at 7.00am!

GARDEN JOTTINGS FROM BRIDGE NURSERY

Your local Hardy Plant Specialists

I understand that the pronunciation of some plant names can cause a bit of difficulty for many people. It's not helped by 'experts' changing the names which can cause confusion, but plants such as delphinium, rhododendron and chrysanthemum are often used with confidence because they are familiar. Here are a few examples of how to say some of the names without any embarrassment.

Verbena bonariensis (bon-ar-ee-en-sis)

Euonymus (you-on-ee-muss)

Cotoneaster (cot-own-ee-ass-ter)

Helianthemum (heel-ee-anth-ee-mum)

Meanwhile, there is plenty to do if the weather allows it and for you to get some fresh air and vitamin D.

Plant garlic, sow broad beans, take hardwood cuttings, sow sweet peas but keep them away from mice, rake up leaves and add to the compost bin or fill plastic sacks (with added holes in) so they can rot down, lift dahlias and store in a frost-free dry place, plant indoor bulbs such as Narcissus Paperwhite for an amazing scent, finish planting tulips, plant any bare-root trees and shrubs. And you thought it was time to 'put the garden to bed'?


