LATEST PRIORS MARSTON CHURCHYARD CEDAR TREE UPDATE



We have permission from Stratford District Council to remove the dangerous branches from the substantial cedar tree on the north side of the churchyard. The tree professional is scheduled to do the work between Monday 16th December 2024 and Wednesday 18th December 2024 inclusive.

Meanwhile, there is a serious and continuing risk of those branches giving way and falling onto the ground immediately below the tree canopy. For health and safety reasons, the north side of the churchyard will remain taped off and closed to all pedestrians until further notice to avoid exposing people to the danger area.

Commonwealth War Graves in St Leonard's Church Priors Marston:

Helen Elizabeth Russell and Tommy Hart

On Remembrance Sunday, about 65 residents of Priors Marston met at the War memorial for a service of remembrance for the 11 men from Priors Marston who died as a result of the First World War. The names of each of those men was included on the Roll of Honour read out as part of the service.

We have no one listed on the war memorial at Priors Marston who died in the Second World War and this, in part, may be down to the fact that a large proportion of young people in Priors Marston would have worked on the land at that time and farmers and agricultural workers were exempted from military service as they worked in a 'reserved occupation'.

However, we have in St Leonard's Churchyard two Commonwealth War Graves. One is from the First World War, Tommy Hart, whose name is engraved on the War Memorial and has an 'official war grave' grave marker in the south west corner of the churchyard. The second is from the Second World War, Helen Elizabeth Russell, who has a Commonwealth War Grave with a private headstone to the west north west of the church tower.

Commonwealth War Graves commemorate the men and women of the Commonwealth military or auxiliary forces who lost their lives during the

official dates of World War One (4th August 1914 to 31st August 1921 (when the war was officially declared to be over by Act of Parliament)) and World War Two (3rd September 1939 to 31st December 1947). The graves are recorded and maintained by the Commonwealth War Grave Commission (CWGC), which is an inter-governmental organisation consisting of six member states (UK, Australia, Canada, India, New Zealand, and South Africa) whose principal function is to mark, record, and maintain the graves and places of commemoration of Commonwealth Nations military services who died in the two world wars. All the graves are recorded in the CWGC 'Debt of Honour Register', which has over 1.7 million entries, including Helen Elizabeth Russell, who was born in, and is buried in, Priors Marston. They include people killed in action, died of wounds, died of illness and accident and include those who died of suicide, homicide and judicial execution.

Helen joined the ATS at Mons Barracks in Aldershot in 1939 and gave her birth year as 1896 (seven years younger than her true birth date of 1889) so that she just fell inside the upper age limit of 43. In reality, she was 50. She must have looked a strange figure on the parade ground as all the other entrants at that time were aged between 21 and 25, but she obviously did well in the service as she become a warrant officer class 2 CSM, company sergeant major, with a service number of W/12756. She died whilst still serving in the ATS on 16th August 1945 and therefore qualified for an official Commonwealth War Grave and for her name to be engraved on a war memorial. At the time of her death, her address was Maybury House, The Ridge, Woking, which is a large Victorian building now converted into flats, but was no doubt requisitioned by the ATS at the time. However, she died in Rugby Emergency Hospital, so may have been staying with her family when she was admitted to hospital. The cause of death was carcinoma of the lung (lung cancer). The 1946 Probate records indicate that she owned 'Turvens' in Byfield, that she never married and that she left an estate valued at £4163 10s 11d (some £250,000 in today's money). Her executors were her sister Mary and her brother Joseph.

Helen's name is recorded on the Byfield War Memorial as she owned a house there when she died. However, as she was born in Priors Marston, lived much of her life here and is buried in our churchyard in a CWGC recognized war grave, then perhaps we could change the tradition of just including the 11 names from our war memorial (3 of whom also did not die of war wounds) and mention her alongside the First World War fatalities on the roll of honour read out as part of the Remembrance Sunday service.

Report from Your District Councillors

State of the District

At the last Council meeting (14 October), the state of the District was reported upon in terms of information from different sources. It covers many different areas from health to the economy, not all of which Stratford-on-Avon District Council (SDC) can influence. It is important to note that the figures included in the report are from the most recent data available, and reference to events happening at the Council refer to the year ending 31 March 2024 for the most part. We have selected some highlights.

The population of Stratford-on-Avon District in mid-2023 was 141,929. It is estimated to have increased by 16.8% between 2013-2023. This is the 12^{th} highest growth seen out of all local authorities in England and Wales, with the average growth being 6.9%. Population density mid-2023 was estimated to be 145 people per km². This places SDC in the 20% least densely populated local authorities. The population is heavily weighted towards the older age groups, with almost half the district's population - 47% - aged 50 or older.

The median house price for the District was £375,000 in the year to end March 2023, 27% above the Warwickshire median of £295,000, and 29% above the England median of £290,000. The median house price in the District has risen £130,000 or 53% over ten years since the end of March 2013. In comparison, according to the Bank of England inflation calculator, inflation over that ten-year period is estimated to total 34%. The average median house price increase between 2013 and 2023 across all England and Wales authorities was 65%; Stratford-on-Avon therefore saw below-average median house price growth, falling in the bottom quarter of all authorities. The Ratio of House Prices to Earnings was reported to be the highest ratio in the West Midlands region, making homes more expensive relative to earnings both in the region and in England.

The median overall **monthly private rent** payable in the District in the year to end-March 2023 was £875. This was the third highest rent across the West Midlands, with Solihull and Warwick higher at £950 and £945 respectively. Median rent has increased by £100, or 13%, since 2019.

House Building. A total net of 1,435 new dwellings were added to the housing stock in 2022/23. This was the highest figure of net completions of all district authorities in 2022-23. (South Cambridgeshire was second with 1,320 completions.)

Affordable Housing is defined by the National Planning Policy Framework such as Social Rent; Affordable Rent; Build to Rent and Rent to Buy; Discount Market homes; First Homes; Shared Ownership; and Shared equity. In 2022/23, affordable housing made up 38% of net new dwellings, corresponding to 540 out of the total of 1,435.

Recorded Crimes. The total number of recorded crimes in the District in the year to July 2024 was 7,904. This is a rate of 60 crimes per 1,000 people, which is the lowest rate across Warwickshire. This reflects a slight fall on the previous year when the rate was 63 crimes per 1,000 people.

Employment. In March 2024, 14% of the population aged between 16 and 64 years was classed as 'economically inactive', i.e. not in work or looking for work, due to retirement, being a student, being too sick to work or some other reason. Over three quarters of people in employment were classed as employed (77%), while 23% were classed as self-employed.

In August 2024, there were 1,740 residents claiming unemployment benefit in the District. These were evenly split between males and females.

The median gross weekly earnings in 2023 for full time workers who live in the District was £725.40. This was higher than the average for the West Midlands at £651.60, and that for Great Britain at £682.60. However, while both the West Midlands and Great British average wages have risen since 2023, those in Stratford-on-Avon have fallen slightly. Women's weekly

median pay was found to be 79% that of men. and the decrease in median wages for the District is driven by a fall in full time women's wages over the past year.

FROM THE CHURCH OF ST MARY THE VIRGIN

Our Services Harvest Festival

The church was beautifully decorated with flowers, food, fruit and vegetables, and our hymns, readings prayers and thoughts all contributed to our wonder and thanksgiving for all the gifts of the natural world. We noted that many vegetables look like the parts of the body they nourish, for instance carrots, if you look at the cross section, look a bit like an eye and carrots are good for the eyes. Tomatoes have 4 chambers and are red (mostly) and research shows that tomatoes are good for your heart; and so are grapes which hang in a cluster shaped like a heart! And many more as well. We discovered something that even many vicars didn't know! After the Feeding of the 5,000 the disciples collected up 12 baskets full of the left-overs, Jesus said so that nothing should be wasted. But what happened to that food? The disciples did as Jesus told them and went straight back across Lake Galilee where crowds were waiting for Jesus – so of course, those hungry crowds were given the food - no more than a few hours old! Was that the first Food Bank?

The handbell ringers played a harvest hymn plus other well-known tunes; families brought examples of various harvest gifts with prayers of thanks to the display; we sang the well-known harvest hymns and brought gifts of food to the altar. In all, about 20 people took part in some way. A collection was taken and half was sent to The Farming Community Network, for which we prayed in the service prayers, a sum of £157.25. Refreshments were served after the service in the new area at the back of the church. Huge thanks were offered all those who took part in any way. Almost 70 people were present at the service.

The gifts of dry food have now all been taken to the Food Bank in Southam and have been very warmly welcomed! The fresh fruit and veg. was offered in the Lychgate and gratefully accepted.

Remembrance Sunday

We met, 34 of us, at 9.00am at the War Memorial on a dull drizzly morning and followed the short service, which so many parishes would have been using up and down the land. We are very grateful to Ian and Carolyn Bath who brought to the Lychgate the portable sound system which they use to provide the Last Post and Reveille. (One person actually told me he'd looked for the bugler, it sounded so well!) We sang four verses of 'O God our help in ages past' and two verses of the National Anthem to end the service, both accompanied by the 'music machine'. Steve Webb, a new resident in the village, read out the names of the Fallen and laid the wreath.

WEATHER JOTTINGS OCTOBER 2024

October 2024 brought 72mm of rain – just below the average for October this century, of 79mm. The driest Octobers were in 2017 with 17mm and 2011 with 25mm. The wettest Octobers were in 2020 – 146mm and 2013 with 137mm.

Most of the rain - 68mm of it - fell during the first 20 days of the month,


with only 7 days without rain; but from 21st onwards, there was brief rainfall on Friday 25th of 1mm and then overnight on 27th and 28th a further 3mm in total.

Most of the rain during those first 20 days came in small doses. The wettest 'day' was overnight between Friday and Saturday 18th (St Luke's Day) and 19th with 20mm, but with the days either side of it both fine and breezy. Tuesday 8th brought 15mm, beginning at about 3.00pm. Storm Ashley passed over during the early hours of Sunday 21st, but only produced 5mm of rain.

Temperatures for the whole month varied between 11°C and 17°C, somewhat above the average, but no longer exceeding the record.

The warmest days were 17th and 18th, with 17°C. 18th October is St Luke's Day and is reputed for fine weather – "St Luke's little summer" and the coolest was Sunday 13th with 11°C.

There were frosts on 3rd, 4th, 11th and 13th, but most of these were only very slight at about 7.00am in more exposed places. The month began with temperatures of 13°C and 14°C and ended in the same way.

GARDEN JOTTINGS FROM BRIDGE NURSERY Your local Hardy Plant Specialists

Another year draws to a close and what a year it has been. The mostly abysmal weather has caused much annoyance and frustration. It has definitely affected plant sales and I know I'm not alone because the rep from the horticultural supplies company has confirmed that it is the same for many others in this business.

Grumble over, things don't seem so bad after 3 or 4 weeks of being able to work in the garden and tackle some neglected areas.

Do you remember the trend of growing living willow structures? People planted willow arches, domes, tunnels and so on. Over 25 years ago, we fell for it and started a willow dome. It looked good for a few years, although it needed a lot of time to weave and trim the fast growing stems. During the last few years, it had become a mess and much harder to keep the shape. I made the radical decision to chop it all down and start again. Masses of dead wood has been removed by my helper Sarah. Little of the original is left and that will soon be gone too. New rods will be stuck in the ground and it will then be much easier to control for the next few years. If you also have parts of the garden which are either out of control or not looking as good as you would like, don't be afraid of change, it can be very satisfying.


