A Quaint Village Tradition?

There have been several articles about village history in the Parish News recently, but has anyone heard of the Charity of James and Aholiab West, Edwin Robert Birch and Others?

It sounds like something out of a Charles Dickens novel, reminiscent of Ebenezer Scrooge, but it actually exists and is still active in the village.

Founded in the eighteenth century, it was originally established to benefit the poor parishioners of Priors Marston at the discretion of the Churchwardens. With the passing of time, its initial grant (a loaf of bread distributed to poor widows and widowers of the parish at Christmas time) has had to adapt to the modern era. Some villagers will remember the Social Cars Scheme, whereby volunteers provided transport for people attending hospital or doctors' appointments. Very few will know that the charity helped to fund this scheme with a yearly grant. More recently, the charity has contributed towards the Coffee and Chat group Christmas lunch and events to mark the coronation of King Charles amongst other things.

The charity does not possess enormous resources, but funds are available, so if any individual or organisation is thinking of, or in the process of, arranging an event or providing anything which will benefit the village community, please do not hesitate to contact one of the Trustees, Pete Brown, Chris Benson and Elaine Forsyth, or send an email care of the editor of the Parish News - hlmmzs@gmail.com

Report from Your District Councillors - May 2025

Stratford on Avon District Council Recycling Update

From Monday 14 April 2025, residents in Stratford-on-Avon District will be able to recycle more from their doorsteps.

Stratford-on-Avon District Council is introducing an additional recycling service for the collection of plastic bags and wrapping, collected fortnightly within your normal fully commingled recycling service.

Recycled plastic bags and wrapping can be used to make new plastic products such as plastic packaging, 'bags for life', boxes, bins, and agricultural and construction materials.

Recycling plastic bags and wrapping is easy! Just make sure that:

- 1. Your plastic bags and wrapping should be empty and free from food residue and other contaminations.
- 2. Place your plastic bags and wrapping into your recycling bin, **loose**, with your other recyclables.
- 3. Place your recycling bin at the kerbside on your collection day.

Items should not be put within one another or fill bags with recycling.

What can now be recycled:

- All plastic bags
- Confectionary wrappers
- Foil lined packaging
- Cheese, fish, and meat wrapping
- Outer layer bags and wrapping
- Plastic film and sleeves
- Bubble wrap and cling film
- Fruit and vegetable net bags

What **not** to include:

- Pouches, sachets and packets microwaveable food, baby/pet food, cosmetics, detergent and cleaning
- Balloons
- Blister packs, pills, and tablets packaging
- · Compostable or biodegradable bags and wrapping

- Crisp tubes
- Disposable gloves or masks
- Foam or polystyrene of any kind
- Plastic straws or cutlery
- Textiles and clothing put these in a bag at the side of your bin

Community Climate and Nature Fund

On Monday 7 April, Stratford-on-Avon District Council's Cabinet approved more funding for round three of the Community Climate and Nature Fund (CCNF).

£150,000 has been allocated from the Climate Change Reserve to the CCNF, previously known as the Community Climate Change Fund (CCCF), for the next round of funding.

The fund will provide opportunities for the following groups to apply for grant funding:

- Town and parish councils
- Properly constituted community and charity groups operating within the Stratford-on-Avon District
- Sports clubs

As part of the grant application process, the Climate Change Reserve Eligibility and Financial Approval Procedure (CCREFAP) sets out the types of projects that are eligible for funding. These include:

- Physical interventions that generate renewable energy, reduce waste or reduce greenhouse gas emissions from buildings, transport, commercial and industrial processes
- Community initiatives/interventions that reduce greenhouse gas emissions or promote greener lifestyles
- · Delivering projects which enhance biodiversity in an area
- Funding towards measures which provide adaptation to Climate Change
- Research including feasibility studies

Free "Everyone Active" Membership for Residents Living with Parkinson's

Leisure centres across Stratford-on-Avon District are offering free memberships to people living with Parkinson's.

This includes Southam Leisure Centre (but there are others: Stratford Leisure Centre, Shipston Leisure Centre, Studley Leisure Centre and The Greig Leisure Centre in Alcester). These are run by operator Everyone Active, in partnership with Stratford-on-Avon District Council, and offer the initiative co-designed with the charity Parkinson's UK.

A free membership can be given to up to three carers to provide additional support, if needed.

Everyone Active currently supports 75 people across Stratford-on-Avon District living with Parkinson's. It is the fastest-growing neurological condition in the world and there is currently no cure.

Parkinson's affects around 145,000 people in the UK and there are more than 40 symptoms, from tremor and pain to anxiety.

Being physically active can play an important role in living well with Parkinson's. Those living with the condition can find various activities, such as swimming, walking and dance beneficial in managing their symptoms.

Community Safety

Reporting Anti-Social Behaviour

We have been asked to pass this message on by the local police Safer Neighbourhood Team:

We all want our neighbourhood to be a safe and welcoming place, and reporting anti-social behaviour (ASB) plays a crucial role in achieving that. While social media platforms like Facebook can be useful for sharing concerns, they are **not** an official reporting tool. To ensure issues are properly addressed, it's important to report them through the correct channels.

How to Report Anti-Social Behaviour:

- ✓ To the Police:
- Call 101 for non-emergency ASB (e.g., vandalism, persistent noise, public disturbances).
- Call 999 in an emergency (if a crime is in progress or there is an immediate danger).
- Report online via Warwickshire Police Report | Warwickshire Police

Local Authorities: The Council and the Police work in partnership and share relevant information when a coordinated response is needed. When reporting ASB, it's important to provide clear, factual, and relevant information.

Content of your report should include: Date, Time, Location, Descriptions/Details of offenders if known, Vehicle details, make, model, colour, registration (If seen).

What NOT to Include in Your Report: Avoid:

X Vague descriptions – Be specific about what happened, where, and when. Instead of saying "Someone was acting suspicious", describe their actions.

> Unverified accusations – Only report what you have witnessed or have evidence of. Speculation can lead to false reports.

Personal disputes – If an issue is a private disagreement rather than ASB, consider mediation services or speaking to your local council.

Social media posts as a substitute for reporting – Posting on Facebook may raise awareness, but it does not officially log the issue for investigation.

Incidents that "might" happen – Only report actual occurrences not what you think could happen. **Example:** Instead of saying "A group of teenagers might cause trouble later", report "At 8:00pm, a group of teenagers were throwing bottles in the park and shouting at passersby".

Why Official Reporting Matters:

We've noticed that some residents post incidents on Facebook or inform their Parish Councillors, but don't report them to the authorities. While discussing concerns is valuable, without an official report, the police and council cannot take action. Reporting ensures:

- ✓ The issue is logged and investigated properly.
- The authorities can identify patterns and take preventative action.
- Resources are allocated effectively to tackle ASB in our area.

We encourage everyone to use the correct reporting channels while also supporting each other as a community. If you witness or experience antisocial behaviour, please report it directly to the appropriate authorities.

FROM THE CHURCH OF ST MARY THE VIRGIN

Our Services

Mothering Sunday Our late observance for Mothering Sunday seemed a bit 'out-of-place', when everyone else had already celebrated the previous week. However, we had some interesting time exploring a set of Happy BIBLE Families playing cards — mother, father and two children in each family. Jesus' family was quite easy, of course (brother called Simon), and we knew that James and John, two of Jesus' disciples had a father called Zebedee and a mother called Salome............. but what about Moses? We know that Aaron was his brother, Miriam was his sister, and Amram his father, but very few people know that his mother's name was Jochebed!

Palm Sunday All the liturgical hangings were Red! The delayed Mothering Sunday meant that just one week later we were celebrating Palm Sunday and Jesus's entry into Jerusalem, riding on a donkey, with adoring crowds cheering him on all sides. Sadly, at present, we don't have a resident donkey, but we have ponies, and so do our friends, so we had our short procession in the area near the church before our very short service in church, while the ponies grazed in the churchyard. So thank you so much to the families who came with their ponies – all 4 of them!! We all received a cross made from dried palm leaves to remind us that by Good Friday, Jesus would die on the Cross, but then rise again on Easter Sunday. We sang three traditional Palm Sunday hymns and heard the Palm Sunday account from the Bible. Then we remembered that the donkey Jesus rode was borrowed – and that he'd also needed to borrow a boat to cross Lake Galilee, a little boy's lunch to feed the five thousand and that after he died, Jesus was laid in a borrowed grave! In fact, he had no possessions of his own at all! And everything he'd borrowed was given back to its owner and Jesus spent all his time helping other people and teaching about God, his Father. Then we thought about lending and borrowing our possessions, and how one 'had-been-pretty' hat had been to Buckingham Palace without its owner.

And then how we can give things to people which cost us nothing – like a smile or a handshake or a kind word – just like Jesus did. Our beautiful service of Evensong at 5.00pm wasn't quite the same, with our thoughts centring on the more serious meaning of Palm Sunday.

<u>Easter</u> So as I write, we look forward to the events of Maundy Thursday, Good Friday and Easter Day, as announced in the May issue of the magazines. The frontals will, of course, change from red to white for Easter Day. But on the Sunday after Easter, 27th April, we shall offer a 'Carol' service for Easter – because "Without Easter there'd be no Christmas and without Christmas there'd be no Easter". This year, the Carol Service will be at Napton in place of the usual Evensong and it will be just like a Christmas Carol Service, but with different words!!!!! So very easy to enjoy!!!!

<u>Ascension Day</u> Forty days after Easter, on 29th May, we celebrate the Ascension of Jesus back into heaven, witnessed by his closest friends. This is an important festival as it marks the precise end of Jesus' appearances on earth. The forty days take us to a Thursday, but we shall still celebrate with one service for the Bridges Group in the evening at Priors Hardwick, hopefully. And it will be another, slightly shortened 'Carol Service', so that as many people as possible will feel very welcome. There are some lovely Ascension Day hymns to very well-known tunes!

WEATHER JOTTINGS MARCH 2025


March 2025 came in like a lamb, went out like a lamb and remained like a lamb throughout. Total rainfall came to just 10mm, which brings the total for the year to 120mm. There was no rain at all for the first nine days of the month, then Monday 10th brought a noticeable East breeze and light rain with a brief hail shower in the late afternoon. But I could only record 'Trace'. Then it remained dry until the weekend of 22nd and 23rd, when we received 0.5mm during the Friday night and 7mm overnight from Saturday to Sunday. I recorded another 1mm early on Tuesday 25th and likewise on Friday 28th. In contrast to February, the only significantly cloudy days were Saturday 15th and Tuesday 25th.

The first four days began with a frost, then temperatures rose towards the end of the week from 8°C to 16°C. But from 11th until 17th, they remained in single figures with a frost on most mornings, although most days were fine and sunny. From 18th until the end of the month, the temperature varied only between 12°C and 16°C. For most of this time, there was a light breeze from the east, which occasionally become more than just a breeze which ruined the pleasure of the sunshine!

Overall reports on March weather, in England and Wales, were that this year, March was the sunniest on record and England was the driest on record.

If it was the snowdrops that excelled themselves in February, it was certainly the primroses that excelled in March. In my garden, even in the poorest soil, they spread in all directions as magnificently healthy plants with deep yellow flowers and in the churchyard, there appeared a veritable carpet of bloom of yellow, pink and mauve, which spreads year by year.

GARDEN JOTTINGS FROM BRIDGE NURSERY

Your local Hardy Plant Specialists

Last month, I went to the meeting for all who open their gardens for the National Garden Scheme in Warwickshire and the West Midlands. It's a kind of pep talk to let us know how much was raised in the region last year (£70,000) and to hear representatives from two of the beneficiaries speak of how important the donations are for their charities. Please try to visit some of the gardens listed online, there are many different styles of gardens and often tea and cake to be enjoyed. Bridge Nursery is open every weekend and Bank Holiday Mondays until the end of September, where you can see a wide range of plants growing (mostly) quite happily in the heavy clay soil. I raised £1,800 last year, so many thanks if you were among my visitors.

There is lots to do later this month, when the risk of frosts should be over. You can:

- plant out summer bedding plants half way through May
- sow more hardy annuals such as cosmos, marigolds and asters
- plant out cabbages, cauliflower and lettuces
- sow sweet corn, hardy cucumbers and courgettes
- also sow dwarf French beans and runner beans either direct into the ground or in cell trays for replanting later
- feed roses
- leave any greenfly to let the birds or ladybirds feast on them.

And don't forget to visit some open gardens.

During the last couple of winters, I have been visiting The Gambia with a bird-ringing group and shall be giving an illustrated talk at the WI meeting on the 21st May at the Priors Hall in Priors Marston, if you are interested in coming along. It will be an open meeting and illustrated with some photos taken during the trips – some by me and even better, by some friends who have kindly shared their pictures with the group.

Thank you very much to the people who have contacted me recently with their news – Swallows and House Martins have been seen in the village and Blackcaps have returned to gardens and I would be delighted to hear from anyone hearing or seeing such birds as Swifts, Curlew or Cuckoos as they could potentially be arriving to breed locally or be passing through on the way to their breeding grounds elsewhere.

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
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
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
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
