
#### **THANK YOU**

# You can find Paradise in St Leonard's church in Priors Marston?

A few weeks ago, Helen Franklin had a visitor who was captivated by the two modern windows in the church. She wanted to know about the artist and the background to the windows. That led to some brainstorming and searching in the Vestry, but very soon we put together the answer!

The window on the North Wall has always been known as the Garden of Eden window, and a notice beside it records that it was donated by Mary Watson in 1993 in gratitude to God for more than 50 years of flowers, fun, love and laughter in this village. The window was designed and crafted by Henry Haig, ARCA.

So, we then turned our attention to the glowing window in the South wall. We had always known that it was given by Jill and Michael Carter. Usually known as The Holy Spirit window, because of the dove at the top and what seem to be the tongues of fire of Pentecost, the inscription below tells us "Music **dwells** within our hearts and is a **token** of our faith". Jill loved puns: David Wells was long the organist and choirmaster in Priors Marston and Ken Phillips the beloved vicar of the Parish.

But when was it installed and who was the artist?

Helen turned her attention to the archived Parish Magazines and quickly found the answer! An article in the Parish News of April 1993, by Reverend Ken Phillips revealed that, amazingly, this window was also designed and crafted by the same artist, as explained in the magazine article. So, Henry Haig again!

The next step was to Google Henry Haig! He was an abstract artist, painter and sculptor who lived between 1930 and 2007. He was notable predominantly for his stained glass work. He created windows for churches and cathedrals all over the country. Do please look at the Wikipedia article! It mentions our two windows in Priors Marston Church and so we discover that the Carter window was to depict the Creed!

Now there is an exercise for a Sunday morning!

So, how do you find Paradise? Paradise is a Persian word, meaning a pleasure ground, or park, or king's garden and it came to be associated with the Garden of Eden in our Creation stories and then as a synonym for Heaven. Why not look carefully at the Garden of Eden window, enjoy the cool, refreshing colours and see what you can find? Thank God for His Creation and all the living things around us. You could then walk out into the churchyard and enjoy the sights and sounds around you.

Or why not sit in a pew by the South Wall and enjoy the vibrant colours of the "Holy Spirit" window? Rejoice in the gift of music in our lives and in the church, as Jill and Michael Carter did.

The other stained-glass windows in the church tell their own stories. Maybe that is an article for another day?

#### Report from Your District Councillors - May 2025

#### **Warwickshire County Council Elections**

Although a County Council Election, it was administered here by Stratford District Council. Our District Council Ward overlaps three County Council Divisions – Napton and Shuckburgh is grouped in with Southam and Stockton. Priors Marston, Priors Hardwick and Wormleighton are part of the very large Feldon Division, which includes Long and Bishops Itchington, Harbury and Fenny Compton. Further south, our Ward is also covered by Kineton Division. The outcome for all three Divisions was one of no change, with all three councillors retaining their seats, although in the Feldon division there was some excitement with a series of recounts showing the incumbent holding off the challenge from the Lib Dem candidate by a narrow margin of 7 votes or 0.21% of the votes cast. Congratulations to Andy Crump, Chris Kettle, and Chris Mills (Kineton).

Thanks to all to all who voted and assisted with the elections in whatever form. The full result for Feldon Division, covering Priors Marston, Priors Hardwick and Wormleighton was:

There were also two Stratford District Council by-election seats, one of which was vacated by the elevation of Cllr Perteghella to Parliament last year. Both were previously held by the Lib Dems and there was no change in political affiliation.

Unfortunately, the Parish Council has decided it is not able to help with a contribution which is disappointing and rather disturbing. We are approaching other possible sources for funding assistance and will hope and pray for a more positive response.

In the meantime, does anyone in the Parish have any time and inclination to give a hand in some way? Any help will be so appreciated. St Leonard's is the oldest heritage-listed building in our village and deserves to be highlighted by the immediate surrounding area. We are fortunate to have this beautiful building here and should remember that it is not only for the celebration of 'matches, hatches and despatches' and needs care to remain so. Please can you give a hand and don't forget it will be a gift for the whole community.

#### FROM THE CHURCH OF ST MARY THE VIRGIN

<u>Our Services</u>. Easter, The Maundy Thursday, and Good Friday services were celebrated for the Group at Stockton, Napton and Priors Marston. (Some of us were engaged in leading services elsewhere as well!) It being a Third Sunday of the month, Rev David Herbert led a well-attended service of Holy Communion for Easter here. However, the style and content of the Holy Communion service doesn't suit everybody, so as usual on the Sunday after Easter we celebrated with the Easter 'Carol Service', because without Easter there'd be no Christmas and without Christmas there'd be no Easter. This year being the 4<sup>th</sup> Sunday of the month, the service was held at Napton in place of the routine Evensong. There were eight hymns, some locally written, but all to well-known tunes, six Bible Readings, some prayers and a short talk - and all in just less than an hour. The floral decorations in the church were beautiful, well reflecting the joy of the festival, and as usual the refreshments were a real treat. Very many thanks to all involved. The service was once again well attended and much enjoyed.

Ascension Day. Without the Ascension, Easter would not be complete. For forty days after his Resurrection, Jesus was seen in many different places by many different people including the disciples. But he gave instructions just to the disciples that they should meet him for his Ascension as witnesses that he had in fact returned to his Father in heaven. So we shall celebrate (shall have celebrated, by the time you receive this magazine) the Ascension at Stockton on Thursday 29<sup>th</sup> May at 7.30pm, which is forty days after Easter – 20<sup>th</sup> April. The service will be a bit shorter than the Easter one – seven hymns and six readings – all well-known tunes!

Pentecost or Whit Sunday, as we used to call it, comes ten days after the Ascension, thus fifty days after Easter. We have many words in English beginning 'Pent', all based on the ancient Greek word which means five. For the Jews, Pentecost was already a festival celebrating the grain harvest, and the following day was the day on which they celebrated the day God Gave the Ten Commandments to Moses at the top of Mount Sinai. But we celebrate a new sort of Pentecost – the day when the disciples became Apostles, co-workers in spreading the Gospel, rather than learners. The service on Sunday 8<sup>th</sup> June here at Priors Hardwick at 5.00pm will be similar to the one we used for the Ascension. And there may be a surprise with the tune for one of the hymns! The liturgical hangings will be RED for Pentecost but return to WHITE for......

Trinity Sunday. This Sunday marks the conclusion of our studies following the actual life of Jesus and is followed by all the Sundays after Trinity and until Advent (this year 24 of them) when we study the content of the last three years of Jesus's life.

After this, the liturgical hangings return to GREEN for most of the twenty- four Sundays until the beginning of Advent.

<u>VE DAY.</u> With the added interest of the 80<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the ending of the Second World War and its relevance to our village, we held a short Service of Remembrance at 11.00am at the War Memorial and then with the rest of the nation's churches (nearly), we chimed the church bells for 10 minutes at 6.30pm. We remembered especially the three members of the Haynes family who fell in that second World War as well as another from that same family who had fallen in the Great War. You can see a group of ten memorials in the churchyard, which are lovingly and regularly tended to this day as well as others elsewhere in the churchyard.

#### The Church Building

<u>The Leaded lights.</u> We have now received the third quotation which is so different from the first two that we're again seeking further advice!!

<u>The new facilities.</u> We still await an answer to the Faculty we applied for some time ago, in our attempt to ascertain the status of the vestry floor. However, we now know that the Quinquennial inspection of the entire building and churchyard will begin on 3<sup>rd</sup> June. This is likely to last for a few days, after which a very detailed report will be supplied with a list of work to be done and a time-scale according to the urgency of each item. <a href="Church"><u>Church</u></a>. Perhaps this is a moment to thank those who so faithfully clean and tidy and polish the interior of the church. It has looked particularly good over the past few months – and this has been noted!

<u>The Churchyard.</u> The fine dry weather has slowed the general growth in the churchyard, which is at present looking particularly good. Very many thanks to all those involved. It does not go without notice that in between times, additional tidying-up jobs have been anonymously completed! Thank you to whoever!!!

<u>Donations in the 'phone box.</u> The flow of donations has picked up again, I'm very happy to report, because there is still a significant need from the Southam Food Bank. The Food Bank is open every Monday morning from 11.00am for receiving donations of food as well as issuing food to those in need. I haven't actually counted the number of volunteers who work there week by week, but it must be about ten – all with a specific task to do. And there seems to be little time to rest!

<u>Used stamps</u> These continue to arrive in the phone box – so thank you very much to all who take the trouble to leave them in the box provided. It's definitely gratifying to see them getting nearer to filling another A4 envelope!

#### **WEATHER JOTTINGS APRIL 2025**

Following a dry month in March, April 2025 wasn't much better – total rainfall of 21mm. But February, March and April are the driest months of the year, with an average monthly rainfall of 46.5, 49.5 and 47.0 respectively. In the past 28 years, April has received more than 100mm four times :1998 - 154mm, 2000 - 116mm, 2004 - 101mm and 2012 - 152mm.


The driest Aprils were 2.5mm in 2011, with 6mm in 2007 followed by 12mm and 13mm in 2022 and 2019 respectively.

No rain fell in Priors Harwick in April this year until some light rain - 1.5mm in the evening of Sunday 13<sup>th</sup>. For those first two weeks of the month, sunshine was abundant, with daytime temperatures peaking at 15-16°C until a sudden rise to 18-20°C over the weekend of 11<sup>th</sup> and 12<sup>th</sup>. Sadly, a bit cooler and less settled for Palm Sunday 13<sup>th</sup>, when we received 1.5mm of rain in the early evening. However, I'd recorded a frost on the morning of Tuesday 1<sup>st</sup> and again on Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday 7<sup>th</sup> to 9<sup>th</sup>. Only very slight on the ground, yet a nuisance on car windscreens for setting off early to get to work!

Tuesday 15<sup>th</sup> was the coldest day of the month, with 12°C, but then the temperature recovered to reveal sunny but breezy and changeable days. There was a slight frost on 17<sup>th</sup> and 0.5mm of rain on Saturday 19<sup>th</sup>.

It was during the last 11 days of the month, that the main rainfall came: 4mm late morning of Monday (nuisance for the washing) and then a considerable surprise on the morning of Wednesday  $14^{th} - 15$ mm in the rain gauge during the night of Tuesday  $13^{th}$ . Temperatures remained in the mid 'teens until Sunday  $27^{th}$ , when  $18^{\circ}$ C led to  $24^{\circ}$ C by the end of the month, with temperatures much higher elsewhere in the country







#### **GARDEN JOTTINGS FROM BRIDGE NURSERY**

Very little is predictable at Bridge Nursery. Top of the list is the weather (every year is different), then visitor numbers can vary enormously from day to day, also there are 'in' plants which change from year to year. No-one wanted hostas or Carex elata 'Aurea' last year, but both are selling well this season. I need that crystal ball, I need to be able to second guess what will be desirable now.

Oak before ash, you're in for a splash, ash before oak you're in for a soak. If this dry weather continues, it will be very challenging to grow any fruit and veg. It is ironic that after the excessive rainfall during winter 2023/24 we now need our crops and gardens to be rained on. On the plus side, there seems to be almost no slug or snail damage.

In case you missed sowing various vegetable seeds, there are other people who have a surplus. Try asking the question on local Facebook pages and/or visit village fetes and open gardens, where you may well find some young plants for sale for just a few pence. It's such a shame that Greenleaf Nursery on the edge of Southam was demolished for HS2; he grew a good selection. I'm currently watering Sarah's tomato plants, while she is away for a short break, she has far too many......
